

The Learning Zone is open for individual study only.

The social distancing and safety measures have been updated and the following changes have been implemented for your safety:

 Unless you are exempt, students attending a UAL building for any purpose will be required to wear a medical face mask in place of a cloth face covering while on site. These will be issued to you on arrival. Students who

- book into the Learning Zone at LCC at any time during lockdown will be required to wear medical face masks whilst they are using the facility.
- Everyone on site must strictly observe 2-metres social distancing rules, wash their hands frequently and for 20 seconds (and use hand gel) and wear the correct face masks and visors unless they are exempt.
- If you feel ill in any way, you must remain at home and not come onto site. If you think you may have COVID-19, you must get tested and follow the NHS Test and Trace and UAL Report and Trace processes.

Academic Support's focus this year for Access and Participation is writing for first-year BA students. So far, we have worked with students in BA Animation, BA Design Management and Cultures and BA Media Communications.

Peer Mentoring

LCC Academic Support is expanding our network of Peer Mentors .We currently have 33 mentors and 46 mentees (UG and PG), and Peer Mentors have hosted 5 Student Lounges. Watch this video to find out more.

In addition to the Academic Support team, two Visiting Practitioners and a PG student contributed to the week's activities.

Help-seeking behaviour

Students who are motivated to seek support typically perform better .We would love to understand more about why students in all courses and Schools self-select to seek Academic Support (or not).

Good practice

Embedded support increases across the college at all levels, with over 120 workshops in October and November.

- Wellbeing and belonging: Students have found activities which develop their reflective practices very useful, particularly in terms of countering anxiety and building confidence.
- We continue to adapt our teaching for online spaces. Some examples of enhanced provision include:

- We collated guidance on encouraging students to participate using their microphones and/or cameras.
- A session for BA students on Cultural Capitals. Students drew their own 'tree of life' representing their identities.
- Creating an online group activity from a quiz about the differences between analytical and descriptive writing.
- Providing guidance on alternative forms of assessment for students, such as visual essays.
- Encouraging students to undertake tactile activities off-screen such as visualising what one is thinking through mindmapping and making time-management plans.
- We developed an Independent Learning Kit, now published on Academic Support Online.
- Transition events for Block 2 (1–5
 February 2021) include:

 Collaboration
 Arts of attention.

The Academic Progression Tool (APT)

This was piloted on a number of Postgraduate courses during the first term of the new academic year. In terms of International Student Experience this is aided by outreach work with internationally diverse cohorts. The aim is to provide course teams with early indicators and specific interventions to enable as many students as possible to successfully complete their studies. The project will expand in 2021 to reach a greater number of MA courses. The APT team will be running some online training sessions in how to use the tool, details of which will be sent out in January.

Online drop in sessions

There has been a steady flow of Tier 4 students using the online drop in appointments. With online support now firmly embedded this should increase during the spring term. Students can book through the moodle site 'Current International & EU students' which all students are enrolled on. This has a booking system which lists a number of available dates and times. The Digital Learning platforms at UAL will continue to play a significant role in 2021 as the blended learning approach continues. LCC courses continue to use Moodle as the core hub for online teaching and learning. Moodle is used along with a suite of other digital learning platforms and tools: Collaborate ULTRA, Workflow, myblog, Padlet, Panopto and Microsoft Office 365.

The Digital Learning Team

The LCC Digital Learning Team provide frontline support for the digital learning platforms, but can also support you in the integration of digital learning into your curriculum; assessment; teaching and learning activities; student support; and quality processes. We encourage and promote good practice in digital learning through Blend-it, our self-paced Moodle course for staff about the principles and practicalities of blended learning and teaching. We host regular events such as the LCC Digital Learning Open Forum and the Digital Pedagogy Reading Group. We deliver staff-development sessions in liaison with fellow digital-learning colleagues across UAL. We also advocate on matters of UAL digital learning policy and practice on behalf of LCC.

Academic Progression Tool (APT)

Last year APT was offered to every LCC undergraduate course. This academic year, APT has been offered to all LCC undergraduate and postgraduate courses. This offer includes an APT workbook, prepared by APT Administrator Veronica Otero, for tracking and identifying students needing support, and outreach assistance from Student Experience Officer, Chris Bryant.

Evaluation will be undertaken at the end of block 1 to understand APT's use and impact, which will inform the development of APT moving forward, alongside broader work looking at tutorial practice at the college.

Changemakers

The LCC Changemakers initiative started in April, and since October 2020 all nine programmes have had a Changemaker working with them. The Changemakers are a group of current students and recent alumni, from both BA and MA courses, of mixed ethnicities and fee status, employed through ArtsTemps to work with us for four hours each week during term-time.

In the autumn term of 2020 the Changemakers have been very busy and in much demand. They have been playing an active role in codeveloping decolonised curricula through the course reapproval process, working closely with BA and MA course teams, course reps and the quality team. They have also been supporting BA courses currently in AEM, and the work streams of decolonising curricula, fostering belonging and equity in assessment. These have provided valuable opportunities to embed the practice of decolonising and liberating curricula through looking not only at the representation of diverse practices and practitioners on course reading lists, but also in course content and course delivery.

Through this work, and through attendance to course committees, programme meetings and staff development sessions, Changemakers are building relationships with courses that will lead to more work to co-develop decolonised curricula through the first months of 2021. This will be alongside evaluation of the initiative and recruitment of the next Changemakers.

Decolonising Wikipedia Network

Changemakers are also playing a lead role in the establishment and facilitation of LCC's new Decolonising Wikipedia Network, a partnership project with Wikimedia UK. The network supports students and staff to edit and create Wikipedia entries through a decolonial lens at a scale and pace that suits them. This includes anything from a small intervention to an existing Wikipedia page in a day, to a writing one new Wikipedia page over a month, solo or in collaboration with other network members.

In doing this, the network aims to prompt and support more of the college community to play an active role in decolonising knowledge production and increasing the visibility and credibility of under-represented figures and topics connected to our subject disciplines. Over 30 LCC students and staff have signed-up to the network so far, and several were able to attend the network's first live event on 16 December.

Resuming of student / staff exchanges

We will resume student exchange programmes this Spring with a small number of LCC students participating from February onwards. The College will also be welcoming c.10 students from exchange partners at the start of the next UG block of teaching in February. The University will also shortly resume Erasmus+ staff exchanges from the Spring of 2021 onwards. An announcement to all College staff on how to apply for staff exchanges will be made early in the Spring Term.

All staff and student travel will have enhanced risk assessment in place, along with additional procedures to ensure compliance with post-Brexit immigration policies in the UK and EU.

Virtual collaborative projects with partner universities

Although some staff and student international travel will resume in 2021, in order for more LCC students to have some form of international experience this year, a number of virtual collaborations will be progressing over the course of the Spring Term:

 Communications & Media programme with Ryerson University Professional Communication

- Moving Image & Digital Arts programme with Ryerson University's Global Campus Studio
- Interaction Design & Visual Communication programme with RMIT University

Creative Cities

As part of UAL's deepening relationship with the city of Bilbao, students and staff in LCC's Photography Programme will co-deliver a summer school with staff and students from University of the Basque Country this June, provisionally entitled Images, Community and Partnerships in Practice on the island of Zorrotzaurre in Bilbao. Development work for the project will be continuing over the course of the Spring term.

Values-based partnerships

LCC International will be contributing to a University group over the course of the Spring looking at how UAL may develop a set of guidelines on embedding common ethical concerns and UAL values in to our international partnership work.

Progress on Autumn 2020 update

- UAL International Mobility Working Group (looking at future provision of student mobility in the wake of Brexit, Covid19 and the climate crisis) has now presented to UAL's Executive Board and produced its final report making over 30 recommendations on the future provision and organisation of mobility, as well as addressing some of the barriers to it at UAL. This work will now be taken forward with an implementation plan coordinated by the International Relations Unit.
- Collaboration with Universities UK
 on producing sector guidance on
 internationalisation at home activities and
 short-term mobility will conclude this term
 with focus group meetings and profiles
 of LCC students and courses who have
 delivered projects in these areas.

Work Based Learning and Placements

Work Based Learning and Placements

Diploma in Professional Studies

We have been working on the expansion of the Diploma in Professional Studies (DPS) to the Screen and Media School undergraduate courses. DPS, currently on offer in the Design School, is the optional industry placement year, taking place after the second year in an undergraduate course. DPS offers students the opportunity to undertake placements, self-initiated or freelance projects, socially engaged and entrepreneurial activities. Students who optin DPS gain significant experience, contacts and skills contributing to improved attainment results.

We have been working with courses to develop and organise a DPS offer either via modification or as part of their re-approval. The following five courses across Screen and Media are the first to launch DPS:

- BA (Hons) Animation will introduce the first DPS year in 2022/23
- BA (Hons) Magazine Journalism and Publishing will introduce the first DPS year in 2023/24
- BA (Hons) Journalism aims to introduce the first DPS year in 2023/24

These courses will join forces to offer a joint Professional Practice unit which will prepare students for DPS.

 BA (Hons) Film Practice and BA (Hons) Film and TV aim to offer the first DPS year in 2022/23

Our development work so far has involved:

- Consultations with academic teams to introduce DPS to courses
- Identifying parts of the curriculum best suited to prepare students going out in the industry
- · Modifying units where appropriate
- Developing content for new professional practice units
- Support with the modification and reapproval paperwork
- Working on versions of the DPS handbook to make it bespoke to the three Schools
- Collaborating with teams across LCC including Business and Innovation, and UAL Careers and Employability, to create additional support and resources that will be available to DPS students on their journey in the industry.

The Digital Grid Project

The <u>Digital Grid Project</u> is continuing into the Spring term and the requirements are to engage 23 placement students with SMEs in the London area. 5 placements have already commenced and the remainder are currently being processed and advertised via the Paid Opportunities section of the LCC Work Placements moodle page.

These placements aim to assist SMEs with Digital Marketing, User Experience and Graphic Design whilst also developing the placements students' experience and professional practice. All placements are paid at £13.35 per hour (including holiday pay) via Arts Temps. The Digital Grid Project is open to all LCC students with the relevant skills and experience.

The PLACE

The PLACE remains closed due to Covid–19 until further notice. Therefore the student offer is being moved to online events/workshops in collaboration with Careers and Employability during the Spring term.

Events/workshops are being created in response to the most common queries from LCC Students in order to help build their knowledge and confidence .These will be advertised via the LCC Work Placement Moodle page .

Anti-Racism Community of Practice Teams site

LCC's Anti-Racism Staff Development Teams site now has over 260 staff members, and continues to receive requests from managers for new staff to be added. A number of members are using the site to share resources to help develop our understanding and confidence as a community including resources on critical race theory, decolonising curricula, and freedom of speech. Other members have been getting in touch to say how helpful they find updates to the site, for their personal and professional development.

Spring term staff development

The newly established Decolonising Wikipedia Network has now been introduced to staff and students across college comms channels, and was presented as part of the January Digital Open Learning Forum. It already has over 50 members.

Staff and students are encouraged to join the network to support them to make editorial interventions in Wikipedia on an extra-curricular basis, whilst the LCC Changemakers work with courses to explore possibilities for also embedding this practice into curricula.

LCC's Safety and Freedom reading group, run by Lucy Panesar and Pratap Rughani, will meet again this term to look at the Equality and Human Rights Commission guidance on free speech for higher education.
